

# World Council I Resolutions

Note: Resolutions are not necessarily debated in the order that they appear in this document. Initial Orders of the Day will be provided by council officers and may be amended through delegate motions.

## Guidelines for Approaching Resolutions

Note: Topeka Model United Nations seeks to include as many voices as possible in discussion. Chairpersons will do their best to recognize as many delegates as possible. Council secretaries will track the number of times delegates speak. Wait to be recognized by the chairperson before addressing the council.

### Authorship Speeches

One way to build an authorship speech is by using the same format as a five-paragraph essay.

#### Introduction

1. Think of an introduction. Often, students use quotations from great leaders and thinkers as a way of introducing their speeches.
2. Add a simple thesis. Your thesis should be something like “This resolution must be passed because it addresses \_\_\_\_\_, a serious problem in our world, and gives the UN a way to solve this problem.”

#### Body

3. Now, think of three main reasons that your resolution is a good one. These are your three main paragraphs of your essay/speech. Often, these are related to the ideas expressed in the “hereby” section. What will happen if we don’t pass this resolution? This can be the basis of a paragraph or two.
4. Next, think of supporting points or details that explain, enhance, go along with, add to, support, and expand upon your three main reasons. These are the supporting sentences for each paragraph. Here’s where a little reading and research will pay off, helping you to come up with details and information that support your main points. Talk to classmates, teachers, parents, etc., too, if you feel stuck about what to say.

#### Conclusion

5. This is the last paragraph of your speech/essay. Refer back to your thesis, restating it a little. Use another quote if you want to, to help wrap it up. Refer back briefly to the main ideas of your three paragraphs as a way of emphasizing what you’ve already said, driving it home to listeners.

### Speeches in Affirmation or Negation

It is your job to convince other delegates to support or reject the resolution introduced to the council. Wait to be recognized by the chair to deliver your speech in affirmation or negation.

Use the above format for guidance.

Does your country agree with the resolution as written? Why or why not?

Provide specific reasons for your position.

### Delegation Q&A Session

Has the author provided a time frame for action?

Has the author provided for an amount of money to be spent?

Are there details missing?

Are there any positions that need to be clarified?

# Preparing Amendments to Resolutions

Amendments must be submitted in proper written form to the President prior to being proposed and considered on the floor. The order in which amendments are considered will be in the order in which they are proposed from the floor. Amendments must be written on the amendment forms. Amendment forms may be obtained from council secretaries. Amendment forms must contain all requested information or the amendment will not be accepted by the President.

The following information must be provided:

1. Name of your country.
2. Title and number of resolution being amended.
3. State your amendment using line numbers of the resolution.
4. State how the resolution is deleted, added, substituted, or corrected by the amendment.

ALL DELEGATES must be prepared to debate and ask questions on the resolutions that will affect their country.

11 THE WORLD COUNCIL I:

12  
13 BEING MADE FULLY AWARE of the acute lack of clean water for almost 780 million world  
14 citizens,

15 NOTING that disputes have before arisen over the overuse of water supplies to which many  
16 nations have claim, including the most recent threat of war between Egypt and Ethiopia,

17 BELIEVING that these contentions could be alleviated by the reuse of water drawn from  
18 contested sources, therefore preserving supply and lessening demand,

19 ACKNOWLEDGING that many of its members do not make near any adequate attempt to save  
20 or repurpose spent water,

21 SOBERING to the fact that should this exorbitant waste continue, people the world over will  
22 suffer,

23 However ALSO ACKNOWLEDGING that the reuse and management of water is an expensive  
24 and intensive task, which lies outside of the means of some destitute nations,

25  
26 HEREBY,

- 27 1. Passes an ordinance mandating that all member states must repurpose 50 percent of their  
28 gross water consumption by the year 2070,
- 29 2. Adds that countries which are considered low-income developing by the World Bank are  
30 automatically exempt from this ordinance due to their inadequate means for reaching this  
31 goal and ensuring the safety of the infrastructure needed to reach it,
- 32 3. Furthermore ordains that if a country can prove to the UN that it lacks sufficient  
33 resources to fulfill this quota and presents a comprehensive analysis of their economic  
34 shortcomings, a session of legislation unique to the situation will be held in the Economic  
35 and Social Council, in which it will be decided whether the country in question will be  
36 overruled due to the finding of negligence on the part of said country, will be exempted  
37 from the quota, will be subject to a lower quota, or will receive aid in reaching the quota,
- 38 4. Proceeds to withdraw aid and privileges -as it deems necessary- from any state which  
39 does not possess adequate infrastructure with which to repurpose 50 percent of their gross  
40 water consumption by the year 2070, and has not previously and individually applied to  
41 the UN for assistance when it was required,
- 42 5. Will organize the enforcement of this ordinance within the Economic and Social Council  
43 and the Secretariat whenever the leaders therein deem it necessary, and will dictate that  
44 all issues concerning this ordinance, as well as applications for aid, be presented before  
45 the aforementioned councils.

11 THE WORLD COUNCIL I:

12  
13 FULLY AWARE that the issue of vaccines for all is not as large of a problem in larger, more  
14 developed 1st and 2nd world countries with less population density, and

15  
16 TAKING NOTE that diarrhea-causing viruses such as rotavirus kills around 6000 children and  
17 other viruses kill even more people in 3rd world countries especially Bangladesh each year, and

18  
19 RECOGNIZING that preventable diseases such as this only kill around 60 children a year in The  
20 United States and very few in other 1st world countries, and

21  
22 CONVINCED that many of these deaths would be preventable if the United Nations would band  
23 together to benefit many people by allowing vaccines for all, so

24  
25 HEREBY,

26  
27 1. REQUESTS the member states gather information on diseases and vaccines and create a  
28 budget for vaccines and other medical supplies that include details on:

- 29 a. spending budget,  
30 b. quantity of vaccines needed.  
31 c. what specific vaccines are needed most.

32  
33 2. ASKS the UN to spend the budget on vaccines and other medical supplies for countries  
34 that can't afford them.

35  
36 3. RECOMMENDS the UN use the budget to buy and/or get countries to donate  
37 transportation to deliver the medical supplies and finally.

38  
39 4. CONSIDER creating a group of volunteer medically trained personnel that will routinely  
40 check up on the countries that were aided or new countries that need vaccines,

- 41 a. Routine checkup dates, times, and countries shall be predetermined by the United  
42 Nations.

13 ADDRESSING that in article 25 of the Declaration of Human Rights states that everyone has the  
14 right to a standard of living adequate for the health and well-being of himself and his family, and

15  
16 RECOGNIZING that less than 70% of the world is vaccinated against most serious diseases, and

17  
18 NOTICING that approximately two-thirds of unvaccinated children live in developing countries,  
19 and

20  
21 DEEPLY CONCERNED that around 3,500,000 annual deaths by children under five are  
22 preventable with vaccines, and

23  
24 AWARE that an increase in vaccine distribution will significantly lower poverty rates by  
25 decreasing health-related expenses, and

26  
27 CERTAIN that action needs to be taken to give widespread vaccinations, especially by  
28 developing countries,

29  
30 HEREBY,

- 31
- 32 1. Declares that the UN requires that vaccines are made a human right, and provided for all,
  - 33
  - 34 2. Designates a fund created to support countries that cannot financially provide free
  - 35 vaccines to all citizens,
  - 36
  - 37 3. Requires that any Member States must file a report to the Economic and Social Council if
  - 38 they request funding,
  - 39
  - 40 4. Strongly encourages that UN Member states make vaccination centers such as hospitals
  - 41 and clinics more widespread in developing countries.

16 ALARMED that the crisis's effects on other countries could lead to other countries' economic  
17 downfall, and

18  
19 RECOGNIZING that the burden of providing for more than 1 million people is too much for one  
20 country, and

21  
22 CONVINCED that the situation should be solved from a global perspective instead of a national  
23 perspective,

24  
25 HEREBY,

- 26
- 27 1. Requires United Nations Members based on their country's economic stability to host a  
28 portion of refugees.
  - 29 2. A fund will be established, in which the hosting countries will use to pay the expenses of  
30 the refugees.
  - 31 3. In addition to providing jobs, education, homes, and food, not just for a term, but in the  
32 scenario of a refugee requesting for citizenship in the country, the funds will also be used  
33 to restore security into the bordering countries that have struggled with the Venezuelan  
34 economic crisis, as well as restoring Venezuela's economy.
  - 35 4. Abuse of funds from hosting countries will result in the loss of their membership.

26 cellular companies to establish connections for those who don't have it;

28 2. We ask for a budget of 10 million USD to make a secure connection across a country that

13 ASHAMED by the reputation of our country and others on the topic of clean and safe water, and

15 IDENTIFYING the limited access to clean water plants throughout the world, especially in the  
16 continent of Africa, and

18 DISTRESSED that 5,000 children under the age of 5 die each year due to water-related illnesses,  
19 and

21 EXCITED for the opportunity of fixing this issue, providing water plants and pumps in every  
22 affected area available to the UN, and

24 HEREBY,

- 26 1. When a country provides evidence that they need clean water services, a customized plan  
27 will be composed to provide services to the country with a maximum budget of ten  
28 billion USD;
- 30 2. Require a water services report from affected countries, as well as a project report on the  
31 construction of the water plants and service;
- 33 3. These acts will be called the Water Services plan and will be a required annual report on  
34 any country that has had or currently reports water issues.

15  
16 NOTING that Jamaica and countless other countries and nations have been greatly impacted by  
17 climate change, whether previous or recent events, and

18  
19 ACKNOWLEDGING that Jamaica has created a national climate change policy framework that  
20 states USAID will support and fund Jamaica's six sector plan, which is responsible for disaster  
21 risk reduction, climate-smart agriculture, climate services, and land management in targeted rural  
22 and urban communities, and

23  
24 CONVINCED that climate change will continue to remain a monumental problem unless  
25 targeted directly and acted upon,

26  
27 HEREBY,

- 28  
29 1. Requests that the UN continue to support the Vision 2030 plan in their attempts to create  
30 a system free of the destruction of climate change and its impacts.  
31  
32 2. Suggests development of a periodical report about each country's situation on climate  
33 change and the rate of speed it is accelerating and predictions moving forward.  
34  
35 3. Requests that all countries involved in the UN able and willing, do everything possible to  
36 create a climate change safe environment around their range of land and property, while  
37 continuing to focus on their prioritized issues and concerns before all else.  
38 a. Possible climate change health changes might include climate-smart agriculture,  
39 conserving energy as often as possible, ceasing waste as regularly as possible  
40 (water, meat, energy, etc.), and generating an awareness of the dilemma.

19 STRESSING the importance of these forests for our everyday needs such as oxygen,

20  
21 ALARMED by the 12.35 million acres of forests that have been burned due to fires,

22  
23 CONCERNED that these fires aren't only hurting the animals by eliminating their environment,  
24 but also by putting carbon dioxide in the air,

26 WITH A FOCUS ON helping Australian forests and other forests that have been burned down,

13 AGREEING with Sustainable Development Goal number 5, achieving Gender Equality and  
14 empowering all women and girls, and

15  
16 ALARMED BY the fact that 1 in 5 women and girls, aged 15-49, have experienced sexual  
17 violence by an intimate partner in the past 12 months, and

18  
19 UNDERSTANDING that this is an unbelievable number and women should never have to worry  
20 about being sexual assaulted, especially by someone who they love, and

21  
22 REALIZING that 49 countries have no laws that specifically protect women from being  
23 sexually assaulted, and

24  
25 KEEPING IN MIND that Bolivia has vowed to ensure new laws to confront violence against  
26 women, and

27  
28 APPALLED that at least 200 million girls and women have been subjected to Female Genital  
29 Mutilation (FGM),

30  
31 HEREBY,

- 32
- 33 1. ENCOURAGEs the 49 countries that have no laws to protect women from being sexually  
34 assaulted to pass laws protecting women.
  - 35
  - 36 2. ASKS the UN to create a task force, whose goal is to educate women throughout the  
37 world on Gender Equality.
  - 38
  - 39 3. REQUESTS that the UN member countries strongly condemn FGM.
  - 40
  - 41 4. URGES the UN to create a task force to educate young men throughout the world about  
42 the benefits of Gender Equality and the detrimental effects of male domination.

11 THE WORLD COUNCIL I,

12  
13 ACKNOWLEDGING that poaching and slash-and-burn agriculture poses major threats towards  
14 our rainforests across the globe, and that deforestation has contributed to the loss of over 20% of  
15 our rainforest,

16  
17 HAVING CONSIDERED the UN-REDD program has the ability to work with developing  
18 countries to prevent and reduce greenhouse-gas emissions by combating deforestation and forest  
19 degradation, as well as taking care of our forests across the world, and

20  
21 EXPECTING that if we don't make changes quickly, with time the state of our climate will  
22 worsen, and our rainforests will be destroyed, without our rainforests we will lose oxygen,  
23 different species of animals, plants, forms of medicine and medical treatment, and many other  
24 issues that will have a detrimental effect on our planet

25  
26 HEREBY,

- 27  
28 1. Strongly urges the UN-REDD program to provide developing countries with the  
29 resources they need to combat the issues contributing to climate change  
30 (especially deforestation, as 15% of global carbon dioxide emissions come from  
31 deforestation).
- 32 2. Calls upon more developed countries to help the countries that are being affected  
33 the most by deforestation (Brazil, Peru, and Bolivia have the highest deforestation  
34 rates) to enforce laws that prohibit people from starting slash-and-burn fires and  
35 cutting down unnecessary amounts of trees.
- 36 3. Recommends that countries prone to poaching enforce more laws that will protect  
37 endangered animals, and that other countries with the proper resources consider  
38 helping developing countries that are currently struggling with poaching issues.

13 ACKNOWLEDGING that not every country has access to clean and accessible water as well as  
14 adequate sanitation, and that around 2 billion people live in countries experiencing “High water  
15 stress,”

16  
17 RECOGNIZING poor sanitation and water polluted with chemicals, plastics, toxins, and other  
18 debris produce major effects on millions of impoverished families including negative impacts on  
19 food security, educational opportunities, deaths from corresponding diseases, and livelihood  
20 choices, and

21  
22 REALIZING that access to clean water and sanitation is a human right, and billions of people are  
23 stripped of that necessity every day and are forced to suffer while other developed countries are  
24 taking for granted what they have, and not recognizing what other countries are forced to live  
25 with,

26  
27 HEREBY,

- 28  
29 1. Asks for funding from wealthier and more developed countries so that we can build more  
30 water and sanitation facilities in less developed countries.  
31 a. Building these facilities in countries that don’t have any and desperately need  
32 them will give poor families access to water and sanitation so that they can use it  
33 for eating, drinking, cleaning, healing and more.  
34 b. Giving impoverished countries these resources can also help decrease the number  
35 of deaths due to diseases from poor sanitation.  
36 c. The cost to build all of these facilities would be around \$28.4 billion per year.  
37  
38 2. Calls for larger countries, like the United States, to cut down on the amount of  
39 wastewater they are dumping into the world's rivers, lakes, oceans and water systems.  
40 a. These great amounts of wastewater put dangerous toxins and chemicals into the  
41 water we use and drink every day, and reducing the amount would lessen the  
42 chance of people drinking unsanitary water and facing the many consequences it  
43 can bring.

13 ALARMED by the 150 cases of malaria in most of Cote d'Ivoire per 1000 people, and that  
14 malaria is the cause of 43% of cases seen in health facilities, and

15  
16 OBSERVING that entomologists have put in place strategies for monitoring mosquitoes that  
17 carry malaria, and

18  
19 REALIZING that other countries in Africa and all tropical and subtropical regions around the  
20 world are experiencing concerning cases of malaria among their citizens, and

21  
22 CONCERNED that malaria cases will increase if Member States do not engage in a coordinated  
23 effort to prevent the spread of malaria, and

24  
25 SEEKING that vaccinations and insecticide nets to be available to all Ivorian citizens,

26  
27 HEREBY,

- 28  
29 1. Requests that the United Nations allocates sufficient funds to ensure full availability of  
30 malaria vaccinations and insecticide nets;  
31  
32 2. Encourages the United Nations creates a committee dedicated to entomological  
33 monitoring and malaria prevention.

15 EMPHASISING, the need for goals and claims to be met by countries regarding greenhouse  
16 emissions, and

17  
18 ALARMED BY, the amount of co2 and greenhouse gas in earth's atmosphere, and

19  
20 SEEKING, a solution to excessive greenhouse gases being released into the air

21  
22 HEREBY,

- 23
- 24 1. Requests that countries who have signed the Paris Climate Agreement meet the goal of  
25 staying 1.5 degrees Celsius or 34.7 Fahrenheit since pre industrial times, doing this by  
26 using more renewable energy sources such as, wind, solar or hydroelectric power.  
27
  - 28 2. Hold countries responsible for using excessive fossil fuels and not implementing  
29 available renewable energy sources to their fullest potential through fines.  
30
  - 31 3. Create grants and funds through the United Nations Framework Committee on Climate  
32 Change to encourage innovation. This grant would be available to people who have  
33 submitted ideas and solutions but need extra support to initiate and implement more,  
34 making renewable energy accessible to everyone.  
35
  - 36 4. Establish attainable goals for the amount energy used,  
37 a. Making 25% of energy consumed renewable by 2025.  
38 b. Reducing greenhouse gas emissions by 10% by 2030.

17 development and the achievement of the 2030 Agenda's 17 Sustainable Development Goals,

18  
19 NOTICING that a shortage of resources continues to hinder South-South and triangular  
20 cooperation in ensuring holistic and coherent partnership in creating sustainable development,

21  
22 CONVINCED that an increase in financial resources and technical cooperation for South-South  
23 and triangular cooperation is needed,

24  
25 HEREBY,

- 26  
27 1. Requests that multilateral, regional and bilateral financial and development institutions to  
28 consider increasing financial resources and technical cooperation.  
29 a. Increased financial resources and technical cooperation may be used to help  
30 South-South and triangular cooperation efforts to create sustainable development.  
31  
32 2. Requests that able and involved Member States increase contributions to the United  
33 Nations Fund for South-South Cooperation (UNFSSC).  
34  
35 3. Strongly requests the need to reinvigorate the United Nations role within existing  
36 resources with the approval of respective Governments.

11 THE WORLD COUNCIL I:

12  
13 SHOCKED that in the past fifty years, 17 % of the Amazon rainforest has been destroyed, and  
14 those destruction rates are on the rise, and

15  
16 RECOGNIZING the increasing amount of burning rainforests in the areas of Brazil, North  
17 America, Southern Africa, and Australia, as well as other nations, and

18  
19 ACKNOWLEDGING that our own nation has a high risk, as high as 50% each year, for major  
20 forest fires that could be devastating to the economy and the welfare of our citizens, and

21  
22 OBSERVING the massive deforestation actions carried out by humans around the world for  
23 various reasons,

24  
25 HEREBY,

26  
27 1. Requests that the United Nations increases spending on the prevention of global fires.

28 a. All member states will pool funding for these prevention efforts.

29  
30 2. These funds will pay for educators to work with the UN Environmental Programme  
31 (UNEP) and the UN Educational, Scientific, and Cultural Organization (UNESCO) to  
32 create educational materials in multiple languages.

33 a. Materials will focus on increased awareness of areas where wildfires are likely to  
34 begin and methods for prevention.

35 b. Educational materials will also be created to be distributed to the scientific  
36 agencies in member state governments providing support for stricter laws  
37 regarding deforestation and littering.

REALIZING that clean water and sanitation is an imperative aspect of a country's development, and

ACKNOWLEDGING the set organizations which have provided and helped many families in need of clean water and sanitation products, and

ALARMED BY the fact that in 2015, 844 million people did not have essential drinking water services and 2.3 million people do not have fundamental sanitation services,

HEREBY,

1. Address the issue of water pollution and public defecation
  - a. To reach the issue at a national level, local and regional education programs should be established to spread information regarding water pollution and sanitation in the region and in general. These programs should be based on reliable, current information provided by UNICEF (United Nations Children Fund). The education programs should be offered to local volunteers who will be willing to spread the newly learned knowledge to other local members.
2. Encourages factories and facilities to use environmentally friendly, recyclable products to minimize clean water waste and provide clean water sources.
3. Requests third party water treatment project evaluation from nations who have effective established treatment facilities.
  - a. Outside evaluation could monitor safe levels and provide technical assistance.
4. Further explore financial aid
  - a. Potential solutions exist after seeking investment from other nations in grants or assistance from non-governmental organizations (NGOs). The financial assistance, whether from nation or organization, will be used to develop programs to improve public sanitation such as building and distribute public access toilets to communities in need.

14 Panama & Colombia. This area is known for drug smuggling and is home to many powerful and  
15 far reaching drug lords. These cartels are smuggling drugs such as heroin and cocaine north into  
16 central or south into South America.

17  
18 CURRENTLY In the Darien Gap men are paid up to \$700 to traverse the jungle with  
19 rudimentary backpacks made of vines carrying up to 20kg of cocaine to the borders of Panama  
20 and Columbia. "Horses saddled with hundreds of kilos have even been sent unmanned over the  
21 border," said Commissioner Abdiel Lezcano of Senafront. Once drugs reach Yaviza or other  
22 points on the Pan-American Highway, they are hidden above, below and inside vehicles, in  
23 everything from gas tanks to paneling.

24  
25 CONVINCED: That if countries in southern and central America form a committee to end this  
26 trafficking of drugs on mass scales across the border of Panama and Columbia.
