Note: Resolutions are not necessarily debated in the order that they appear in this document. Initial Orders of the Day will be provided by council officers and may be amended through delegate motions.

Guidelines for Approaching Resolutions

Note: Topeka Model United Nations seeks to include as many voices as possible in discussion. Chairpersons will do their best to recognize as many delegates as possible. Council secretaries will track the number of times delegates speak. Wait to be recognized by the chairperson before addressing the council.

Authorship Speeches

One way to build an authorship speech is by using the same format as a five-paragraph essay.

Introduction

1. Think of an introduction. Often, students use quotations from great leaders and thinkers as a way of introducing their speeches.
2. Add a simple thesis. Your thesis should be something like “This resolution must be passed because it addresses _____, a serious problem in our world, and gives the UN a way to solve this problem.”

Body

3. Now, think of three main reasons that your resolution is a good one. These are your three main paragraphs of your essay/speech. Often, these are related to the ideas expressed in the “hereby” section. What will happen if we don’t pass this resolution? This can be the basis of a paragraph or two.
4. Next, think of supporting points or details that explain, enhance, go along with, add to, support, and expand upon your three main reasons. These are the supporting sentences for each paragraph. Here’s where a little reading and research will pay off, helping you to come up with details and information that support your main points. Talk to classmates, teachers, parents, etc., too, if you feel stuck about what to say.

Conclusion

5. This is the last paragraph of your speech/essay. Refer back to your thesis, restating it a little. Use another quote if you want to, to help wrap it up. Refer back briefly to the main ideas of your three paragraphs as a way of emphasizing what you’ve already said, driving it home to listeners.

Speeches in Affirmation or Negation

It is your job to convince other delegates to support or reject the resolution introduced to the council. Wait to be recognized by the chair to deliver your speech in affirmation or negation.

Use the above format for guidance.

Does your country agree with the resolution as written? Why or why not?

Provide specific reasons for your position.

Delegation Q&A Session

Has the author provided a time frame for action?

Has the author provided for an amount of money to be spent?

Are there details missing?

Are there any positions that need to be clarified?

Preparing Amendments to Resolutions

Amendments must be submitted in proper written form to the President prior to being proposed and considered on the floor. The order in which amendments are considered will be in the order in which they are proposed from the floor. Amendments must be written on the amendment forms.

Amendment forms may be obtained from council secretaries. Amendment forms must contain all requested information or the amendment will not be accepted by the President.

The following information must be provided:

1. Name of your country.
2. Title and number of resolution being amended.
3. State your amendment using line numbers of the resolution.
4. State how the resolution is deleted, added, substituted, or corrected by the amendment.

ALL DELEGATES must be prepared to debate and ask questions on the resolutions that will affect their country.

12 RECOGNIZING the lack of feasibility of complete, irreversible denuclearization as
13 propounded by many advocating western powers, and

14
15 ACKNOWLEDGING Russia's historical relations in handling peace matters in the
16 Korean Peninsula, and

17
18 AWARE that sanctions and pressure applied to North Korea are not beneficial in
19 resolving conflict and are not evidence of peaceful motives, and

20
21 CONVINCED that reciprocal and equal actions will yield long-lasting
22 peace,

23 HEREBY,

- 24 1. Requests all foreign nations with military outposts held in the Korean Peninsula to
25 immediately begin returning troops and military resources back to their home
26 country
- 27 2. Requests a multilateral Russian-led committee to be formed under the following agenda
28 a. Reduction in development of weapons of mass destruction in North Korea
29 such as:
 - 30 i. Long and short range ballistic missiles
 - 31 ii. Nuclear warheads
 - 32 iii. Chemical and biological weapons
- 33 b. Reciprocal action of demilitarizing by neighboring countries;
34 specifically, reducing troop presence near the border of South Korea
35 with North Korea
- 36 c. Gradual reduction of sanctions currently placed upon North Korea and its allies
37 as 2a and 2b are met
 - 38 i. Sanctions to be reduced should most notably include those that
39 limit natural gas and oil imports as well as labor exports
- 40 3. Request that while any or all nations possess nuclear weapons, ballistic missiles, or
41 any other weapons of mass destruction, North Korea along with any other scrutinized
42 nation will be allowed to possess similar capabilities
- 43 4. Require a treaty to be signed and ratified by all nations to promote stability in the
44 region while allowing for reasonable military defense
- 45 5. Recommends increased economic activity by and with North Korea to revitalize
46 its economy.

11 THE POLITICAL COUNCIL:

12
13 RECOGNIZING that child, early, and forced marriage are violations of human rights,
14 consequently making young girls more susceptible to marginalization and significantly lowering
15 their quality of life, and

16
17 AWARE OF THE FACT THAT various initiatives, including the Global Programme to
18 Accelerate Action to End Child Marriage, have been implemented, and

19
20 NOTING that, in certain contexts, the practice of forced marriage is often not formalized,
21 registered, or recognized under a federal or religious authority; and on that account, information
22 needs to be gathered regarding those arrangements,

24 HEREBY,

1. Proposes forming the Program for Southeast Asian Female Empowerment (also referred to as SAFE), a division of the UNFPA-UNICEF Global Programme to Accelerate Action to End Child Marriage based in Vietnam, to raise awareness and break societal norms in rural communities where gender inequality is most prevalent.
 2. Requests partnerships with organizations, such as the Alliance Anti-Traffic, to provide comprehensive sexual education and reproductive health classes in schools.

13 REALIZING that violence against journalists, including kidnapping, enforced disappearance,
14 arbitrary detention, and torture, have increased over the past decade,

15
16 ACKNOWLEDGING the growing threats to the digital safety of these journalists, especially to
17 female journalists,

18
19 NOTING that between 2012 and 2016, 530 journalists were killed, averaging two deaths per
20 week,

21
22 RECOGNIZING that more than 50 percent of journalists face intimidation by interest and
23 political groups,

24
25 HEREBY,

- 26
27 1. Requests for all member states to establish a media shield law that would protect
28 journalist confidentiality and their sources.
29
30 2. Asks all member states to bring information regarding judicial follow-ups of journalist
31 killings to UNESCO (United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization)
32 to be compiled in the biannual Report on The Safety of Journalists and the Issue of
33 Impunity.
34
35 3. Establish a committee headed by the five veto powers in the Security Council that will
36 document incidents related to journalist intimidation, whether through physical
37 interactions or through the internet.

13 ENCOURAGED by the historic diplomatic event that is the Panmunjom Declaration for Peace,
14 Prosperity, and Reunification of the Korean Peninsula, and
15
16 RECOGNIZING the need to encourage positive relations between the Democratic Republic of
17 Korea and other nations, and
18
19 RECONSIDERING the previous aggressive policies by various members of the United Nations
20 and their effects on diplomatic relations with the Democratic People’s Republic of Korea, and
21
22 NOTICING the Democratic People’s Republic of Korea’s efforts towards improving diplomatic
23 relations,
24
25 HEREBY,
26
27 1. Reciprocate the Democratic People’s Republic of Korea’s efforts towards improving
28 diplomatic relations.
29
30 2. Encourages the development of inter-Korean relations, specifically in the form of a
31 permanent peace treaty for the Korean War.
32
33 3. Requests that the member nations of the United Nations encourage de-proliferation from
34 all sides.
35
36 4. Requests that the member nations of the United Nations adopt policies similar to the
37 Republic of Korea’s Sunshine Policy.
38
39 5. Urges the members of the United Nations Security Council to promote diplomatic
40 relations between the Republic of Korea and the Democratic Republic of Korea.

11 THE POLITICAL COUNCIL:

13 ACKNOWLEDGING the accessibility and vastness of information readily available on the
14 internet, and

15
16 ALARMED by the fact that only 58% of the world’s population can access such a resource, and
17

18 RECOGNIZING how information is integral to creating a globalized society built on
19 accountable relationships and mutual respect and recognition, and
20

21 CONVINCED that increasing the availability of the internet along with sources such as it will
22 help remedy many of the problems plaguing our globalized society

23
24 HEREBY,

- 25
- 26 1. Requires United Nations member states with strong digital infrastructure to provide
27 internet access basics such as internet access towers and servers to provide citizens with
28 internet access basics.
29
 - 30 2. Requires United Nations member states with strong cyber defense tools such as antivirus,
31 data recoveries and virus payload research to members without tools who file requests to
32 the United Nations correctly.
33
 - 34 3. Requires member states to build a collective internet research branch which consists of
35 cellular data and strong infrastructure to provide members without internet access to build
36 internet infrastructure.
37
 - 38 4. Requires members with the strongest internet infrastructure to send internet researchers
39 such as I.T, antivirus researchers and coders to the branch for internet infrastructure to
40 accelerate research.

10 THE POLITICAL COUNCIL:

11 OBSERVING the increasing number of displaced refugees building up worldwide, and
12
13 ALARMED BY widespread policies discouraging immigration and closing access to asylum and
14 other services intended for refugees, and
15
16 AWARE OF the economic and political benefits that countries experience from immigration,
17 and
18
19 EMPHASIZING the unbearable conditions that many refugees have to go through and the
20 responsibility of the United Nations and member nations to combat those struggles
21
22

23 HEREBY,

- 24
- 25 1. Greatly increase the funding and scope of the UNHCR, to better facilitate acceptance of
26 refugees
27
 - 28 2. Urge all member nations in areas of high concentrations of refugees to accept percentages
29 of their population.
30
 - 31 3. Create a set of guidelines for global refugee/immigration policies that would include
32 a) Sufficient funding and safety regulations for refugee camps.
33 b) Strengthening asylum laws to better fit the needs of a growing displaced population.
34 c) Ensuring that discrimination on the basis of ethnic or religious statuses does not take
35 place in the immigration process.
36 d) Providing an efficient process to accommodate newly introduced refugees into the
37 countries that accept them.

11 THE POLITICAL COUNCIL:

12 UNDERSTANDING that air pollution has exceeded established guide levels, and

13 RECOGNIZING the water pollution caused by mining, meat packing, tannery, and other
14 industries, and

15 BAFFLED by the number of endangered animal species that is still rising in number, and

16 NOTICING that the Division of Environmental Health is a government agency that has a
17 responsibility of Uruguay's environment,

18
19

22
23 HEREBY,

- 24
25 1. Ask that the United Nations enforce the law to all other member nations to ban the use of
26 wood stoves which have been proven to emit harmful particulate matter emissions.
27
28 2. The United Nations would provide funds necessary for research into creating the most
29 inexpensive and clean stoves possible that are not made of wood.
30
31 3. The United Nations will aid Divisions of Environmental Health in all member countries
32 to ensure that human activity does not disrupt habits of endangered species.
33
34 4. If habitats of endangered species are disrupted in any way by a member country, they will
35 pay a hefty fine imposed by the United Nations; this money would go into further
36 funding for the Divisions of Environmental Health.

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11 THE POLITICAL COUNCIL:

13 ALARMED by the expansion of nuclear programs under states such as India, Israel, and North
14 Korea that pose an imminent threat to global security, and

15
16 RECOGNIZING the similarly frightening issue the changing climate and lack of renewable
17 energy production encompasses, and

18
19 CAPTIVATED by the potential for a robust nuclear energy sector in nations like Iran, yet

20
21 RESOLVED to promote both nuclear energy use and non-proliferation/denuclearization efforts

22
23 HEREBY,

- 24
- 25 1. Effectively amends UN Resolution 70/1 (the Sustainable Development Goals) subpoint 7,
26 “Affordable and Clean Energy,” to include a goal of increasing nuclear energy yield by
27 120% by 2030 and affirms the international right of all nations to enrich uranium with the
28 purpose of reaching said goal.
 - 29 2. Officially recognizes the State of Israel, Islamic Republic of Pakistan, Republic of India
30 and Democratic People’s Republic of Korea’s failure to comply with the first pillar of the
31 Treaty on the Non-Proliferation of Nuclear Weapons (NPT).
 - 32 3. Requires all non-observer member states to:
 - 33 a) Impose economic sanctions or cease military aid to violating states designated
34 under “Hereby (2)” .
 - 35 b) Donate or invest at least .05% of their GDP in joint ventures organized by
36 member states to increase nuclear energy production.
 - 37 c) If designated as a violating state by “Hereby (2)”, commit to total and absolute
38 denuclearization by 2030, with regular monitoring administrated by the
39 International Atomic Energy Agency.
 - 40 4. Bans states not in compliance with “Hereby, (3)” from non-permanent seats on the
41 UNSC, and if not in compliance with “Hereby, (3)” subpoint c), relegate all UN delegates
42 to observer status in their respective councils.

13 DEEPLY CONCERNED about the fact that every year 1 billion youth experience violence, and
14 9 out of 10 children live in a country that permits corporal punishment,
15
16 APPALLED by the fact that approximately 5 children perish daily due to abuse,
17
18 RECOGNIZING that approximately 69 countries still allow corporal punishment in a school
19 setting and,
20
21 KNOWING that an underwhelming 58 out of 195 member nations have outlawed corporal
22 punishment,
23
24 HEREBY,
25
26 1. Delegates are required to implement policy and legislation outlawing corporal
27 punishment.
28
29 2. Demands that legislative steps be taken towards the global eradication of child violence.
30
31 3. Encourage countries that have not yet joined the Global Partnership to End Child
32 Violence to do so immediately.

13 RECOGNIZING the world has become considerably reliant on non-renewable resources, and

14
15 NOTICING the impact of crude oils, coal, and natural gases have on our environment and the
16 quality of life around the globe, and

17
18 AWARE of the dangers of these non-renewable resources and the harm they bring to wildlife
19 and human life, and

20
21 INSPIRED by the accomplishments brought about by the Sustainable Development Goals
22 specifically number seven, the Paris Climate Agreement, and the progress made by UNEP
23 (United Nations Environment Programme)

24
25 CONVINCED that further action needs to be taken by all nations to ensure the world we leave
26 for our future generations is alive and thriving

27
28 HEREBY,

- 30 1. Urges for taxes on coal usage and production, which will be used to decrease countries'
31 dependence on this harmful air pollutant.
 - 32 a. A 4% tax is recommended to be imposed in each country by 2025
 - 33 2. Sets attainable goals in place that call supporting countries to increase dependence on
34 renewable resources, such as...
 - 35 a. Countries renewable resource dependency needs to increase at least 2% by 2025.
 - 36 b. Countries need to be making a noticeable improvement in providing ways for
37 their citizens to be less fossil fuel reliant (ie. building wind and solar farms).
 - 38 3. Requests grants in order to establish solar farms across UN countries, beginning in
39 Africa, to provide an alternative source of energy to coal.
 - 40 a. Grants will be requested from outside organizations, including the Environmental
41 Defense Fund and the Sierra Club Foundation.
 - 42 b. As one solar farm, powering approximately 200 homes, costs roughly one million
43 dollars, \$165 million dollars will be requested.
 - 44 c. The first focus city will be Kitale, Kenya, the grants will be used to power half of
45 the cities' homes and businesses.

14 unwarranted and unjustified attacks from Western nations hiding behind their ever-changing
15 definition of morality and,

17 AFFIRMING that economic sanctions are ineffective and counterproductive tools for change
18 that often result in government instability, a phenomenon the Middle East does not need more of,
19 and

20
21 REALIZING that the most common system of Western aggression comes in the form of
22 economic sanctions that severely inhibit the prosperity of Middle Eastern life and,

23
24 CONVINCED that actions taken by the United Nations to limit Western aggression against the
25 Middle East would aid in the human development of said nations,

29 1. Requests that the UN limit the effects of negative sanctions by
30 a. revoking the UN membership status of any member-states that place sanctions
31 targeting members of the Economic Cooperation Organization;

34 c. encouraging member-states to aid and invest in sanction-affected nations;
35 d. encouraging member-states to place retaliatory sanctions on countries targeting
36 other member-states via economic means;

38 2. Urges the UN to provide compensation to the member-states of Iran and Pakistan as
39 reparations for the economic harm caused by previous UN sanctions.

28 responsibility for any illegal immigration from or through their borders.

30 Regional Tensions” committee which would send observers to the Immigration
31 checkpoints of member states to oversee that proper security measures are being followed
32 by all signatories.
33 3. Failure to follow the policies outlined by the Reduction in Regional Tension Committee could
34 result in sanctions against said member states until they return to a state of compliance with the
35 accord.

23 1. Create a mediated forum for representatives of government lacking official diplomatic
24 relations to negotiate directly without having to resort to protecting powers or proxies,

26 2. Accept representatives of partially-recognized states and governments into the forum
27 for direct bilateral negotiation,

28

29 3. Strictly require and enforce the neutrality of NGOs partnered with the United Nation
30 that operate in regional conflict zones.

22 for these refugees.

13 COMPREHENDING the bloody path that terrorist groups leave behind, like destroyed villages,
14 and that Boko Haram killed 7000 in 2014 and has continued a violent rage, fueled by murder,
15 rape and kidnapping, and

17 REGRETTING that terrorism in Africa has shown no sign of stopping, and the general unrest
18 has caused a free-fall of the standard of living and life expectancy in the continent, and millions
19 of people have been misplaced from their homes, and

21 AWARE THAT the United Nations' Office of Counter Terrorism is equipped to fight this issue,
22 but if stronger action is not taken that the annihilation of African life will be left unchecked, and

24 CONVINCED that this resolution represents a major step toward eliminating the terrorist groups
25 ISIS, Boko Haram, and others and will eventually bring greater peace to all of Africa,

29 1. The United Nations Economic Social Council provide 73,871,916 Rands, or 5,000,000
30 US dollars to member states in the west of Africa to be used on counter-terrorism. If it is
31 found by a United Nations consortium that a member state is using funds for other
32 purposes, the International Court may prosecute, and sanctions decided by said
33 consortium may be applied.
34 2. Member states in the consortium are not to be African countries, or from the surrounding
35 region, so as to remain corruption free, and these member states will be confirmed by the
36 General Assembly voting on said states.
37 3. United Nations troops be deployed in western African member states willing to house
38 said troops. Troops are to stand in protection of villages at risk.
39 4. United Nations provide arms and ammunition to member states in western and southern
40 Africa to be used in counter terrorism interests. If it is found by a United Nations
41 consortium that the members are not using arms for counter terrorism purposes the
42 International Court may prosecute, and sanctions decided by said consortium may be
43 applied.
