Note: Resolutions are not necessarily debated in the order that they appear in this document. Initial Orders of the Day will be provided by council officers and may be amended through delegate motions.

Guidelines for Approaching Resolutions

Note: Topeka Model United Nations seeks to include as many voices as possible in discussion. Chairpersons will do their best to recognize as many delegates as possible. Council secretaries will track the number of times delegates speak. Wait to be recognized by the chairperson before addressing the council.

Authorship Speeches

One way to build an authorship speech is by using the same format as a five-paragraph essay.

Introduction

1. Think of an introduction. Often, students use quotations from great leaders and thinkers as a way of introducing their speeches.
2. Add a simple thesis. Your thesis should be something like “This resolution must be passed because it addresses _____, a serious problem in our world, and gives the UN a way to solve this problem.”

Body

3. Now, think of three main reasons that your resolution is a good one. These are your three main paragraphs of your essay/speech. Often, these are related to the ideas expressed in the “hereby” section. What will happen if we don’t pass this resolution? This can be the basis of a paragraph or two.
4. Next, think of supporting points or details that explain, enhance, go along with, add to, support, and expand upon your three main reasons. These are the supporting sentences for each paragraph. Here’s where a little reading and research will pay off, helping you to come up with details and information that support your main points. Talk to classmates, teachers, parents, etc., too, if you feel stuck about what to say.

Conclusion

5. This is the last paragraph of your speech/essay. Refer back to your thesis, restating it a little. Use another quote if you want to, to help wrap it up. Refer back briefly to the main ideas of your three paragraphs as a way of emphasizing what you’ve already said, driving it home to listeners.

Speeches in Affirmation or Negation

It is your job to convince other delegates to support or reject the resolution introduced to the council. Wait to be recognized by the chair to deliver your speech in affirmation or negation.

Use the above format for guidance.

Does your country agree with the resolution as written? Why or why not?

Provide specific reasons for your position.

Delegation Q&A Session

Has the author provided a time frame for action?

Has the author provided for an amount of money to be spent?

Are there details missing?

Are there any positions that need to be clarified?

Preparing Amendments to Resolutions

Amendments must be submitted in proper written form to the President prior to being proposed and considered on the floor. The order in which amendments are considered will be in the order in which they are proposed from the floor. Amendments must be written on the amendment forms.

Amendment forms may be obtained from council secretaries. Amendment forms must contain all requested information or the amendment will not be accepted by the President.

The following information must be provided:

1. Name of your country.
2. Title and number of resolution being amended.
3. State your amendment using line numbers of the resolution.
4. State how the resolution is deleted, added, substituted, or corrected by the amendment.

ALL DELEGATES must be prepared to debate and ask questions on the resolutions that will affect their country.

21 INSPIRED by some governments supporting an overwhelming majority of refugees in their

26 1. Create a committee, overseen by the UN Security Council, and headed by The Russian
27 Federation, to help determine the number of refugees that can be supported by a country.
28
29 2. Have countries who fail to comply with the committee's demands face trade sanctions in
30 the form of asset freezes.
31
32 3. Create a fund controlled by the committee in collaboration with The World Bank, that
33 member nations may donate to in order to help fellow member nations support refugees.

30 nations under 500 square kilometers still plant trees if they see fit. Member countries in
31 need may request UN aid to help in the tree planting initiative.

13 NOTING WITH DEEP CONCERN that gender equality is a fundamental human right, still
14 either nonexistent or lacking in developing countries, causing negative impacts on families,
15 communities, and the entirety of the economy, and is crucial for the ability to eliminate barriers
16 such as poverty and global challenges;

17

18 FULLY AWARE that exceptional efforts have been made to attempt to close the gender gap
19 present in the world's current status;

20

21 FURTHER acknowledging the efforts of international organizations, such as UN Women, have
22 made in order to combat this world-wide epidemic, as well as the efforts of individual nations
23 being made to promote women's empowerment;

24

25 DEEPLY EMPHASIZING that the absence of gender equality would not only prevent
26 advancements on economic issues, but would women to marginalize even more than present
27 policies do today;

28

29 HERBY,

30

31 1. CALL UPON the United Nations to ensure all women have proper access to health care,
32 and safe learning/working environments at all levels, by giving more UN funding to
33 organizations promoting gender equality;

34

35 2. CALL ON international communities to implement education programs in order to
36 ensure women have the same access to professions that men have;

37

38 3. REQUESTS a worldwide fund-raising campaign aimed at the general public to contribute
39 to the Associate for Women's Rights in Development, to assist the movement of
40 equitable distribution of wealth at a global level;

42 4. FURTHER REQUESTS each individual nation struggling with gender equality, to help
43 unleash the full potential of both genders to participate in the economy through points 1,

17 FULLY ALARMED that China is the number one leader in carbon emissions, constitutes the
18 need for change, acting as the first step to better air quality by sparking more global efforts;

19
20 RECOGNIZING China's previous, and current, efforts by the Air Pollution Action Plan (APAP)
21 that deals with fully eliminating the burning of coal for heat and power in Beijing, including
22 China's PM2.5 (Particulate Matter) concentrations that has decreased by 43% since 2013;

25 the first step to combating climate change;

29 1. EMPHASIZES how bettering air quality, on a global-scale, is the first step to fighting
30 climate change;

32 2. CALLS UPON all of the world's factories, including China's industrial plants that
33 produces 12.4% of the global trade, to switch from the use of coal mines for energy to the
34 use of solar energy to run the 10 million industrial factories around the world;

36 3. TAKING INTO CONSIDERATION the time it takes to switch to a new system of
37 energy, planning to have the installment of solar panels all over the world, a complete
38 transition to be done by 2075;

40 4. CONFIDENT that the transition to a more environmentally friendly energy source will be
41 a large economic investment, and be the beginning to completely eliminating the use of
42 fossil fuels to run industrial factories.

11 RECOGNIZING the continual growth of individuals forcibly displaced worldwide,

12
13 DISTRESSED by the fact that at least 10,000 minor refugees have fallen victim to human
14 trafficking after arriving in Europe,

15
16 ENCOURAGED by UNICEF'S efforts of providing protection to migrant & refugee children
17 along with efforts to assist asylum-seekers through the European Refugee Fund,

18
19 INDOCTRINATED that without proper solutions, the European refugee crisis, and moreover the

13 ALARMED by the lack of decisive international action on climate change, and
14
15 ACKNOWLEDGING that all countries, including ourselves, could do much more to reduce our
16 carbon emissions, and
17
18 ENCOURAGED by the Paris Agreement,
19
20 HEREBY,
21
22 1. Require all United Nations member states to pledge to reduce their power generation
23 carbon emissions by 80% by 2030, 95% by 2040, and 99% by 2050.
24 a. The power generation methods for this pledge do not have to be renewable. They
25 simply must be carbon neutral.
26 b. In order to keep a secure electrical system during this transition, at least 50% of
27 the overall power per country must depend on power generation methods not
28 dependent on specific environmental conditions (ex: wind and solar).
29 c. Because most countries will be unable to reach the 50% non-environmentally
30 dependent power generation with sources like hydroelectric and geothermal, each
31 country should support and subsidize the creation of many new nuclear fission
32 power plants.
33
34 2. No country should interfere with another country's nuclear power generation as long as
35 the county generating nuclear power allows for UN inspectors to monitor the country's
36 uranium enrichment.
37
38 3. Require all United Nations member states to pledge to utilize carbon-neutral ways of
39 producing concrete by 2040.
40
41 4. Member states that fail to meet the requirements will be removed from the UN.

21 1. Create a committee that investigates cost-effective sanitation solutions that are tailored to
22 the region.

24 2. Request a partnership with the World Bank to assist us in the construction of sanitation
25 facilities that are up to the World Health Organization (WHO)'s standards.

27 3. Begin these programs in rural areas of Central America, but if proven effective, expand to
28 other deprived regions.

17 NOTING that the country of St. Vincent and the Grenadines has already begun implementation
18 of a United Nations Development Plan for climate adaptation,
19

20 REALIZING that the international community has failed in its responsibility to even meet the
21 modest targets set at the Paris climate accords,
22

23 RECOGNIZING that along with our fellow island nations that there is no possible future for
24 continued living within the sovereignty of our own borders.

35 the acceptance of this new category of refugees.

- 37 3. The United Nations will establish a fund to coordinate donations and contributions from the
38 private and public sectors to assist with the relocation of said refugees.

8 OBSERVING the never-ending reality of discrimination and violence thrown upon women and
9 girls on a global scale, and

10 ANALYZING the psychological grassroots behind the concept of treating females as inferior to
11 males, and

12 REALIZING that history has carried this thinking since the beginning of civilization and
13 ingrained them into everyday society, and

14 UNDERSTANDING that feminism and the efforts to bring equality to females is in no way
15 irrational, and

16 UPHOLDING the responsibility to respect the basic human rights of every human regardless of
17 skin color, race, or GENDER,

18 HEREBY,

19 1. Require all countries to implement the publicization of gender norms and equality into
20 the general zone of their citizens.

21 a. Social media/the internet: Technologically advanced states spend a ridiculous
22 amount of their lives on social media, simply because their country has the
23 resources to thoroughly enjoy the experience. The federal governments and/or
24 independent companies that authorize their country's internet media should
25 restrict and ban any sexist or female degrading posts, and encourage the
26 discussion and uploads of posts that bring a positive light to gender equality.

27 b. Literature: As with the influence of social media; books, newspapers, magazines,
28 and other forms of literature should all exclude any forms of sexism.
29 Governments should strictly regulate the contents of this literature to enforce pro-
30 feminist ideology and also make sure that no independent companies are profiting
31 from the discrimination of women and girls.

32 c. Early education: Schools should teach students at the youngest age possible about
33 gender norms. Equipping a child with the correct knowledge is essential in order
34 to prevent history from repeating itself in the future generations. We have already
35 seen the patterns of our global stories spiral into the current generation. The
36 discrimination of women and girls is not old news. It is a severe issue happening
37 in the status quo, today, and possibly even right at this second. We must do what
38 we can to stop this terrible, morally incorrect, and dehumanizing problem and the
39 solution is to start with our future society.

40 2. Enforce an international coalition between all participating states to contribute to each
41 other's success in the effort. This can be carried out through sharing individual
42 information and statistics and discussing the most efficient strategies in blocking out the
43 sexist ideas at future gatherings. This is not a solution that can only be solved by one
44 state. We must all work together to address this issue. By making mutual contributions,
45 we can also gain a net benefit of increased international trust.

19 FULLY ALARMED by the deaths worldwide of over 1.5 million children annually from
20 vaccine-avoidable diseases, and

21

22 RECOGNIZING that without immediate action, we are putting the next generation of citizens all
23 around the world at risk of these diseases,

24

25 HEREBY,

26

27 1. Epidemiologic surveillance programs, early reporting, and rapid response systems should
28 be restored immediately.

29

30 2. Adequate supplies for mass vaccination and routine immunization should be ensured and
31 additional adjunct supplies should be stockpiled to assist in the establishment of standard
32 treatment protocol and epidemic rapid response measures.

33

34 3. Requesting that the Gavi alliance consider expanding their scope of aid to assist many
35 other low-income countries that struggle to provide adequate healthcare and vaccines to
36 their citizens.

38 4. Increasing vaccination coverage in vulnerable age groups should be made mandatory,
39 especially in high-risk areas, such as areas with low vaccination coverage.

16 NOTICING that in developing countries around the world, people have little access to
17 vaccinations and reliable healthcare. Many countries around the world are also currently facing
18 unprecedented outbreaks of vaccine-preventable diseases due to insufficient vaccination
19 coverage rates, and

20

21 AWARE of organizations such as the World Health Organization (WHO) who are updating the
22 public constantly about outbreaks, such as Cholera in Bangladesh, as well as trying to get
23 accessibility to vaccinations around the world. The WHO declared vaccine misinformation as
24 one of the main health threats of 2019, and

25

26 PERSUADED that education about vaccinations are just as important as receiving them, and

27

28 HEREBY,

29

30 1. Proposes that UN member states should agree to require education about vaccinations
31 and their benefits for both children and adults.

32

33 2. Asks that UN member states that comply with the vaccination education requirements be
34 provided with UN sponsored grants to fund this supplemental health education.

14 greenhouse gases continues to threaten the economy and welfare of nations around the world
15 despite many nations' countless efforts, and

17 ACKNOWLEDGING that although many countries have agreed to take action against climate
18 change through the Paris Accord or other United Nations agreements, some still find it difficult
19 to make the changes required due to economic barriers, and

20

21 CONFIDENT that by transitioning to primarily renewable energy, many nations can begin
22 making great strides into reducing greenhouse gas emissions and minimizing the effects of
23 climate change on a global scale,

24

25 HEREBY,

26

27 1. Requests that a fund be created to provide financial assistance to member states for the
28 purpose of manufacturing, installing, and maintaining clean, renewable energy sources. It
29 will be funded through voluntary contributions from governments, institutes and
30 individuals. A governing body consisting of representatives from contributing countries
31 and an appointed United Nations task force will oversee the collection and distribution of
32 funding, as well as monitor the use of the funding in the chosen location.

33

34 2. The clean, renewable energy sources are to be manufactured, installed and maintained by
35 private corporations in contributing countries so as to create jobs, promote economic
36 growth and improve the global economy in its entirety.
